
Years 4 Homework Grid Roman Britain

Roman numerals: introduction


These are the Roman numerals:

It's just all too Roman for me...




The rules for making numbers with these numerals are as follows:

- 1 The numerals should be written in order of size, with the biggest first.
- 2 The same numeral cannot be written more than three times in a row.
- Writing a numeral after a bigger numeral means 'add it on'. (VII means 5 + 1 + 1 = 7 and XIII means 10 + 1 + 1 + 1 = 13)
- 4 Writing a numeral before a bigger numeral means 'subtract it'. (IV means 5 1 = 4 and IX means 10 1 = 9)
- 5 I can be used before V and X.
- 6 X can be used before L and C.
- 7 C can be used before D and M.
